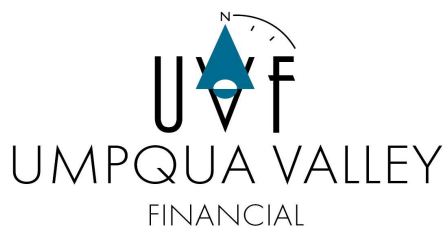

Report on the Audit of the Financial Statements

Opinions

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the governmental activities and each major fund of the Umpqua Public Transportation District as of and for the year ended June 30, 2024, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the Umpqua Public Transportation District's basic financial statements, as listed in the table of contents.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of the governmental activities and each major fund of Umpqua Public Transportation District as of June 30, 2024, and the respective changes in financial position in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Basis of Opinions

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are required to be independent of Umpqua Public Transportation District and to meet our other ethical responsibilities, in accordance with the relevant ethical requirements relating to our audit. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinions.

Responsibilities of Management for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; and for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is required to evaluate whether there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about Umpqua Public Transportation District's ability to continue as a going concern for twelve months beyond the financial statement date, including any currently known information that may raise substantial doubt shortly thereafter.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinions. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not absolute assurance and therefore is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control. Misstatements are considered material if there is a substantial likelihood that, individually or in the aggregate, they would influence the judgment made by a reasonable user based on the financial statements.

In performing an audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, we:

- Exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit.
- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statement, whether due to fraud or error, and design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks. Such procedures include examining, on a test basis, evidence regarding the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Umpqua Public Transportation District's internal control. Accordingly, no such opinion is expressed.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluate the overall presentation of the financial statements.
- Conclude whether, in our judgment, there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about Umpqua Public Transportation District's ability to continue as a going concern for a reasonable period of time.

We are required to communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit, significant audit findings, and certain internal control-related matters that we identified during the audit.

Required Supplementary Information

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that the management's discussion on pages 1-7, schedules of revenues, expenditures and changes in fund balances – budget and actuals on page 29 be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such information is the responsibility of management and, although not a part of the basic financial statements is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board, who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context.

We have applied certain limited procedures to the management's discussion and analysis in accordance with the auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, which consisted principally of inquiries of management about the methods of preparing the information and comparing the information for consistency with management's responses to our inquiries, the basic financial statements, and other knowledge we obtained during our audit of the basic financial statements. We do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the information because the limited procedures do not provide us with sufficient evidence to express an opinion or provide any assurance.

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming opinions on the financial statements that collectively comprise District's basic financial statements. The schedules of revenues, expenditures and changes in fund balances – budget and actuals described on page 29 are the responsibility of management and were derived from and relate directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements. The schedules of revenues, expenditures and changes in fund balances – budget and actuals have been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements or to the financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the schedules of revenues, expenditures and changes in fund balances – budget and actuals are fairly stated, in all material respects, in relation to the basic financial statements as a whole.

Supplementary Information

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming opinions on the financial statements that collectively comprise the Umpqua Public Transportation District's basic financial statements. The supplementary information on pages 31-32 is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the basic financial statements of the Umpqua Public Transportation District.

The supplementary information on pages 31-32 is the responsibility of management and was derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and certain other procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements or to the basic financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the supplementary information is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the financial statements taken as a whole.

Other Information

Management is responsible for the other information included in the annual report. The other information comprises the additional schedules listed in the Other Information section of the Table of Contents but does not include the basic financial statements and our auditor's report thereon. Our opinions on the basic financial statements do not cover the other information, and we do not express an opinion of any form of assurance thereon.



The schedule of expenditures of federal awards, as listed in the Table of Contents, is presented for purposes of additional analysis as required by Title 2 U.S. *Code of Federal Regulations (CFR) Part 200, Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards*, and is also not a required part of the basic financial statements.

Reports on Other Legal and Regulatory Requirements

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, we have also issued our report dated December 9, 2024, on our consideration of the Umpqua Public Transportation District's internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements and other matters. The purpose of those reports is to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. The reports are an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* in considering Umpqua Public Transportation District's internal control over financial reporting and compliance.

In accordance with the *Minimum Standards for Audits of Oregon Municipal Corporations*, we have issued our report dated December 31, 2024, on our consideration of the Umpqua Public Transportation District's compliance with certain provisions of laws and regulations, including the provisions of Oregon Revised Statutes as specified in Oregon Administrative Rules. The purpose of that report is to describe the scope of our testing of compliance and the results of that testing and not to provide an opinion on the District's compliance.

Management's Discussion and Analysis (MD&A) For the Fiscal Year Ended June 30, 2024

The discussion and analysis of Umpqua Public Transportation District's financial performance provide an overview of the District's financial activities for the fiscal year that ended June 30, 2024. This discussion and analysis are intended to evaluate the District's financial performance. Readers should also review the basic financial statements and notes to understand the District's financial performance better.

FINANCIAL HIGHLIGHTS

Key financial highlights for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2024, are as follows:

- The District's ending net position as of June 30, 2024, was greater than the prior fiscal year by \$517,236, at a 17% increase. This is primarily a result of an increase in capital assets acquired with grant funds.
- General revenues accounted for \$14,365 (0.25%) in revenue. Program-specific revenues in the form of charges for services, and grants and contributions accounted for \$5,039,428 (99.75%) of total revenues of \$5,671,709.
- The District had \$5,039,428 in expenses reflecting a \$495,490 (11%) increase from the prior fiscal year.
- Total assets for the year were \$4,023,792 and total liabilities were \$518,214.
- The General Fund ended the fiscal year with a fund balance of \$(339,360), due to expenditures exceeding revenues by \$119,068 for the fiscal year. The District is working with the Oregon Department of Transportation to create financially balanced operations.

OVERVIEW OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Management's Discussion and Analysis introduce the District's basic financial statements. The basic financial statements include: 1) government-wide financial statements, 2) fund financial statements, and 3) notes to the financial statements. This report also includes additional supplementary information to supplement the basic financial statements.

Government-wide Financial Statements

The first of the government-wide statements is the *Statement of Net Position*. This is the District-wide statement of financial position presenting information that includes all the District's assets and liabilities. Over time, increases or decreases in net position may serve as a useful indicator of whether the financial position of the District is improving or deteriorating. Evaluation of the overall economic health of the District would extend to other non-financial factors such as the condition of buildings and other facilities.

The second government-wide statement is the *Statement of Activities* which reports how the District's net position changed during the current fiscal year. All current-year revenues and expenses are included regardless of when cash is received or paid. An important purpose of the design of the *Statement of Activities* is to show the financial reliance of the distinct activities or functions of the District that are primarily supported by intergovernmental revenues, principally state and federal transportation grants. The governmental activity of the District includes transportation services.

OVERVIEW OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (Cont.)

Fund Financial Statements

A fund is an accountability unit used to maintain control over resources segregated for specific activities or objectives. The District uses fund accounting to ensure and demonstrate compliance with finance-related laws and regulations. Within the basic financial statements, Fund Financial Statements focus on the District's most significant funds rather than the District as a whole. Major funds are separately reported while all others are combined into a single, aggregated presentation. Individual fund data for non-major funds is provided in the form of individual budgets versus actual statements and combining statements in a later section of this report.

Governmental funds, focus on how money flows into and out of those funds and the balances left at year-end available for spending in future periods. Unlike government-wide financial statements, these statements report short-term fiscal accountability focusing on the use of spendable resources during the year and balances of spendable resources available at the end of the fiscal year.

Since the government-wide focus includes the long-term view, comparisons between these two perspectives may provide insight into the long-term impact of short-term financing decisions. Both the governmental fund balance sheet and the governmental fund statement of revenues, expenditures, and changes in fund balances provide a reconciliation to government-wide statements to assist in understanding the differences between these two perspectives.

Notes to the Financial Statements

The accompanying notes to the financial statements provide information essential to a full understanding of the government-wide and fund financial statements. The notes to the financial statements begin immediately following the basic financial statements.

Other Information

In addition to the basic financial statements and accompanying notes, this report also presents as required supplementary information budgetary comparison statements for the General Fund. The required supplementary information immediately follows the notes to the financial statements. Supplementary information includes combining statements, individual fund statements and schedules, and other schedules. These statements and schedules immediately follow the required supplementary information in this report.

FINANCIAL ANALYSIS OF THE DISTRICT AS A WHOLE

Recall that the Statement of Net Position provides the perspective of the District as a whole. The net position may serve over time as a useful indicator of a government's financial position.

The District's net position at fiscal year-end was \$3,505,579, which is \$517,236 (17%) greater than the net position at the beginning of the fiscal year.

FINANCIAL ANALYSIS OF THE DISTRICT'S FUNDS

Governmental Funds

As noted earlier, the District uses fund accounting to ensure and demonstrate compliance with finance-related legal requirements. The focus of the District's governmental funds is to provide information on short-term inflows, outflows, and balances of spendable resources. Such information is useful in assessing the District's financing requirements. Unrestricted fund balance may serve as a useful measure of the District's net resources available for spending at the end of the fiscal year.

The financial performance of the District is reflected in its governmental funds. As the District completed the year, its governmental funds reported a combined fund balance of \$747,687. The fund balance consists of restricted and unassigned amounts. Of the current fund balances, \$1,087,047 is restricted, and \$(339,360) is unassigned. Because the unassigned amount is negative, it is not available for spending at the District's discretion.

BUDGETARY HIGHLIGHTS

General Fund revenues were budgeted and anticipated to be collected in the amount of \$4,891,954 during the fiscal year. Actual revenues of \$4,592,181 were less than budgeted revenues by \$299,773. The General Fund expenditures budget was under-spent by \$1,351,827. The actual ending fund balance of \$(339,360) was less than the budgeted ending fund balance by \$708,238.

CAPITAL ASSETS AND DEBT ADMINISTRATION

Capital Assets

As of June 30, 2024, the District had invested \$4,364,805 in capital assets, before depreciation reduction. The District received a donation of \$1,802,817 of vehicles from Douglas County in a prior year, which had provided transportation services to the region before the formation of the District. The value of those vehicles was based on insurance valuation reports which reflect fair market value at the time of the donation to the District.

The total depreciation expense for the year was \$388,197. Additional information on the District's capital assets can be found in the Capital Asset Note in the notes to the basic financial statements section of this report.

Long-Term Debt

As of June 30, 2024, the District had a \$459,900 outstanding balance of long-term debt. During the year the District paid \$30,992 in principal and \$15,336 in interest.

ECONOMIC FACTORS AND NEXT YEAR'S BUDGET AND RATES

The primary factors considered in developing the budget for next year were the District's continued commitment to providing public transportation programs for all of Douglas County while maintaining fiscal responsibility to their community.

The District's adopted budget for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2025, amounts to \$11,287,208. Within this budget, allocations have been made as follows: \$4,129,870 to the General Fund, \$3,231,974 to the Bus Replacement Fund, and \$3,877,139 to the Capital Projects Fund. This results in an unappropriated balance of \$48,225, which is available for discretionary use by the District. In comparison, the total budget for the previous fiscal year was \$15,029,272, indicating a reduction of \$3,742,064.

CONTACTING THE DISTRICT'S FINANCIAL MANAGEMENT

This financial report is designed to provide our citizens, taxpayers, investors, and creditors with a general overview of the District's finances and to demonstrate the District's accountability for the resources it receives.

Amounts reported for governmental activities in the Statement of Net Position are different because:

Capital assets used in governmental activities are not financial resources

SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES:

The Umpqua Public Transportation District was organized under the provisions of Oregon Statutes pursuant to ORS Chapter 332 for the purpose of providing public transportation to Douglas County. The District is governed by a separately elected Board of Directors who approve of the administrative officials. As required by generally accepted accounting principles, all activities of the District have been included in the basic financial statements.

The basic financial statements of Umpqua Public Transportation District have been prepared in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America as applied to government units. The Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) is the accepted standard-setting body for establishing governmental accounting and financial reporting principles.

The more significant of the District's accounting policies are described below.

Reporting Entity

In determining the financial reporting entity, the Umpqua Public Transportation District complies with Governmental Accounting Standards Board Statement 14 as amended, "The Financial Reporting Entity." The criteria for including organizations as component units within the District's reporting entity, include whether 1) the organization is legally separate (can sue and be sued in their name); 2) the District holds the corporate powers of the organization; 3) the District appoints a voting majority of the organization's board; 4) the District can impose its will on the organization; 5) the organization has the potential to impose a financial benefit/burden on the District; and 6) there is fiscal dependency by the organization on the District. Based on the criteria, the Umpqua Public Transportation District has no component units.

Basis of Presentation

Government-wide Statements: The statement of net position and the statement of activities display information about the District as a whole. These statements include the financial activities of the overall District with most of the inter-fund activities removed to minimize the double counting of internal activities. Governmental activities include programs supported primarily by taxes, grants, and other intergovernmental revenues. The District has no business-type activities that rely, to a significant extent, on fees and charges for support. The District also reports no fiduciary activities.

The statement of activities demonstrates the degree to which direct expenses of a given function are offset by program revenues. Direct expenses are those that are specifically associated with a program of function and, therefore, are identifiable to a particular function. Program revenues include (a) fees and charges paid by the recipients of goods or services offered by the programs and (b) grants and contributions that are restricted to meeting the operational or capital requirements of a particular program. Revenues that are not classified as program revenues, including all taxes, are presented as general revenues. The comparison of direct expenses with program revenues identifies the extent to which each governmental function is self-financing or draws from the general revenues of the District.

Basis of Presentation (Cont.)

Fund Financial Statements: During the fiscal year, the District segregates transactions related to district functions or activities in separate funds to aid financial management and to demonstrate legal compliance. The fund financial statements provide information about the District's funds.

The fund financial statements provide reports on the financial condition and results of operations for governmental activities. Major individual governmental funds are reported as separate columns in the fund financial statements.

The District reports the following major governmental funds:

General Fund – The General Fund is the main operating fund of the District. All financial resources, except those required to be accounted for in another fund, are accounted for in the General Fund. All general revenues and other receipts that are not restricted by law or contractual agreement to some other funds are accounted for in this fund. General Fund expenditures are categorized by Administration, Transportation Operations, Debt Service, and Interfund Transfers.

Capital Projects Fund – This fund accounts for capital purchases for the District.

Bus Replacement Fund – This fund accounts for activities related to purchasing buses for the District.

Measurement Focus/Basis of Accounting

Measurement focus refers to what is being measured; the basis of accounting refers to when transactions are recognized in the financial records and reported on the financial statements. The basis of accounting relates to the timing of the measurement made, regardless of the measurement focus applied.

Government-wide statements are prepared using the economic resources measurement focus and the accrual basis of accounting. The economic resources measurement focus means all assets and liabilities (whether current or non-current) are included on the statement of net position and the operating statements present increases (revenues) and decreases (expenses) in net total assets. Under the accrual basis of accounting, revenues are recognized when earned. Expenses are recognized when the liability is incurred.

Governmental fund financial statements are reported using the current financial resources measurement focus and the modified accrual basis of accounting. Under this method, revenues are recognized when they become both measurable and available. "Measurable" means the amount of the transaction can be determined and "available" means collectible within the current period or sixty days after year-end. Expenditures are recorded when the related fund liability is incurred, except for principal and interest on the long-term debt which is reported when due. General capital asset acquisitions are reported as expenditures in governmental funds. Proceeds of long-term debt and acquisitions under capital leases are reported as other financing sources.

Measurement Focus/Basis of Accounting (Cont.)

The revenues susceptible to accrual are property taxes, charges for services, interest income, and intergovernmental revenues. All other governmental fund revenues are recognized when received, as they are deemed immaterial. Deferred revenues arise when potential revenue does not meet both the "measurable" and "available" criteria for recognition in the current period. In subsequent periods, when the revenue recognition is met or when the District has a legal claim to the resources, the liability for deferred revenue is removed from the balance sheet and revenue is recognized.

The District's policy is to first apply restricted resources when an expense is incurred for purposes for which both restricted and unrestricted from net position are available.

Budgeting

The District budgets all funds as required by state law. The District budgets for all funds on a modified accrual basis. The resolution authorizing appropriations for each fund sets the level by which expenditures cannot legally exceed appropriations. Total expenditures are controlled by annual appropriations at the following organizational levels: instruction, support services, community services, facilities acquisition and construction, and other expenditures. Appropriations lapse as of the fiscal year-end. A detailed budget document is required that contains more detailed information for the above-mentioned expenditure categories.

Unexpected additional resources may be added to the budget using a supplemental budget and appropriations resolution. A supplemental budget may require hearings before the public, publications in newspapers, and approval by the District Board of Directors. Original and supplemental budgets may be modified using appropriations transfers between the levels of control. Such transfers require approval by the District Board of Directors.

Cash and Investments

For purposes of the statement of cash flows, cash, and cash equivalents include cash on hand, checking, savings, and money market accounts, and any short-term, highly liquid investments with initial maturity dates of three months or less.

The District has adopted an investment policy requiring compliance with Oregon statutes, which authorizes the District to invest in obligations of the United States, the agencies and instrumentalities of the United States and the State of Oregon, and numerous other investment instruments.

The District's investments may consist of time certificates of deposit, banker's acceptances, commercial paper, U.S. Government Agency securities, and the State of Oregon Treasurer's Local Government Investment Pool (LGIP). The District's investments are reported at fair value at year-end. Changes in the fair value of investments are recorded as investment earnings. The LGIP is stated at cost, which approximates fair value. The fair value of the LGIP is the same as the District's value in the pool shares.

The Oregon State Treasury administers the LGIP. It is an open-ended, non-load diversified portfolio offered to any agency, political subdivision, or public corporation of the State that by law is made the custodian of, or has control of, any fund. The LGIP is included in the Oregon Short-Term Fund (OSTF) which was established by the State Treasurer. In seeking to best serve the local governments of Oregon, the Oregon legislature established the Oregon Short-Term Fund Board. The purpose of the Board is to advise the Oregon State Treasury on the management and investment options of the LGIP.

Receivables

Amounts due from individuals, organizations, or other governmental units are recorded as receivables at year-end. These amounts include charges for services rendered, or for goods and materials provided by the District. All receivables are expected to be collected. Accordingly, receivables are reported at the gross amount without an allowance for uncollectible accounts.

Receivables are also recognized for federal and intergovernmental grants. In the governmental fund financial statements, transportation revenue not collected within sixty days of the end of the fiscal year are reported as a deferred inflow or resources.

Intergovernmental grant reimbursement and entitlement amounts for which all eligibility requirements imposed by the provider have been met, but which were not received by the fiscal year-end, are reported as accounts receivable.

Restricted Assets and Liabilities

Assets with use restricted to future bond payments and the related liability, if such payments and liabilities exist, would be segregated in the statements of net position. Other restrictions created by State and federal government grant programs may also exist and be reported on the statement of net position. The District has no such restrictions at June 30, 2024.

Capital Assets

The District has established a formal system of accounting for its capital assets. Purchased or constructed capital assets are reported at cost, or estimated cost when the original cost is not available. Donated capital assets are valued at their estimated fair market value on the date received. Maintenance and repairs of capital assets are not capitalized, but rather are charged to expenditures in the governmental funds. The District does not possess any infrastructure. The capitalization threshold used by the District as recommended by the State of Oregon is \$5,000.

In the government-wide financial statements, all reported capital assets except for land and construction in progress are depreciated. Depreciation is computed using the straight-line method over the estimated useful lives as follows:

In the governmental fund financial statements, fixed assets are accounted for as capital outlay expenditures of the governmental fund upon acquisition. Fixed assets are not capitalized, and related depreciation is not reported in the fund financial statements.

Compensated Absences and Accrued Liabilities:

The District has no provision for accumulated unpaid vacation, sick pay, and other employee benefits. A liability for accumulated sick pay does exist; however, it is not readily estimable. Each employee may accumulate sick leave and carry it over to the succeeding year. In a year when sick leave is used, the employee continues the regular salary during the absence to the extent of sick leave earned.

Deferred Inflows/Outflows of Resources

In addition to assets, the statement of financial position will sometimes report a separate section for deferred outflows of resources. This separate financial statement element, deferred outflows of resources, represents a consumption of net position that applies to a future period(s) and so will not be recognized as an outflow of resources (expense/expenditure) until then. Currently, the District has no items that qualify for reporting in this category.

In addition to liabilities, the statement of financial position will sometimes report a separate section for deferred inflows of resources. This separate financial statement element, deferred inflows of resources, represents an acquisition of net position that applies to a future period(s) and so will not be recognized as an inflow of resources (revenue) until that time.

Long-Term Debt

All bonds, notes, and capital lease payable are recognized in the government-wide financial statements as liabilities of the District. Amounts of the long-term debt due within the following fiscal year are included in the current liabilities section of the Statement of Net Position.

In the governmental fund financial statements, proceeds of long-term debt and acquisitions under capital leases are reported as other financing sources. Principal and interest payments on long-term debt are recorded as debt service in the expenditure section of the statement and schedules.

Equity Classifications

Government-wide Statements

Equity is classified as net position, which represents the difference between assets, liabilities, and deferred accounts. Net position is displayed in three components:

- a. Net investment in capital assets - Consists of capital assets including restricted capital assets, net of accumulated depreciation and reduced by the outstanding balances of any bonds, mortgages, notes, or other borrowing that are attributable to the acquisition, construction, or improvement of those assets.
- b. Restricted net position - Consists of net position with constraints placed on the use either by (1) external groups such as creditors, grantors, contributors, or laws or regulations of other governments; or (2) law through constitutional provisions or enabling legislation.
- c. Unrestricted net position - All other net position amounts that do not meet the definition of “restricted” or “invested in capital assets, net of related debt.”

The District’s policy is to first apply restricted resources when an expense is incurred for purposes for which both restricted and unrestricted from net position are available.

Governmental Fund Financial Statements

The governmental fund financial statements present fund balances based on classifications that comprise a hierarchy that is based primarily on the extent to which the District is bound to honor constraints on the specific purposes for which amounts in the respective governmental funds can be spent. The classifications used in the governmental fund financial statements are as follows:

- Nonspendable: This classification includes amounts that cannot be spent either because it is not in spendable form or because of legal or contractual constraints.
- Restricted: This classification includes fund balance amounts that are constrained for specific purposes that are externally imposed by creditors, grantors, contributors, or laws or regulations of other governments, or imposed by law through constitutional provisions or enabling legislation.
- Committed: This classification includes fund balance amounts that are constrained for specific purposes that are internally imposed by the government through resolution of the highest level of decision-making authority, the District Board, and does not lapse at year-end.
- Assigned: This classification includes fund balance amounts that are intended to be used for specific purposes that are neither restricted nor committed. This intent can be expressed by the District Board or through the District Board delegating this responsibility to selected staff members or through the budgetary process.
- Unassigned: This classification includes positive fund balance within the General Fund which has not been classified within the above-mentioned categories, and negative fund balances of other governmental funds.

The District’s policy is to use restricted fund balances first, followed by committed resources, and then assigned resources, as appropriate opportunities arise but reserves the right to selectively spend unassigned resources first to defer the use of the constrained fund balances.

Inter-Fund Transactions

Quasi-external transactions are accounted for as revenues or expenditures. Transactions that constitute reimbursements to a fund for expenditures initially made from it that are properly applicable to another fund are recorded as expenditures in the reimbursing fund and as reductions of expenditures in the fund that is reimbursed. All other inter-fund transactions, except quasi-external transactions and reimbursements, are reported as transfers in the fund financial statements. Non-recurring or non-routine permanent transfers of equity are reported as residual equity transfers. All other inter-fund transfers are reported as operating transfers. For the purposes of the Statement of Activities, all inter-fund transfers between individual governmental funds have been eliminated.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements, in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amount of assets and liabilities as well as disclosures of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenditures during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Pensions

Beginning after June 30, 2020, the District provides a retirement plan for employees through a defined contribution SEP IRA plan. No pension liabilities, deferred inflows, or deferred outflows are reported because of this plan.

CASH AND INVESTMENTS:

For a discussion of deposit and investment policies and other related information, see the Cash and Investments note in the Summary of Significant Accounting Principles.

The District follows the practice of aggregating the cash assets of various funds to maximize cash management efficiency and returns. Various restrictions on deposits and investments are imposed by state statutes. These restrictions are summarized in the Cash and Investments note in the Summary of Significant Accounting Principles.

Investments, including amounts held in pool cash and investments, are stated at fair value. In accordance with Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) Statement No. 31, Accounting and Financial Reporting for Certain Investments and for External Investment Pools, investments with a remaining maturity of more than one year at the time of purchase are stated at fair value. Fair value is determined at the quoted market prices, if available; otherwise, the fair value is estimated based on the amount at which the investment could be exchanged in a current transaction between willing parties, other than a forced liquidation sale. Investments in the State of Oregon Local Government Investment Pool (LGIP) are stated at fair value.

Deposits - All cash is deposited in compliance with Oregon statutes. The insurance and collateral requirements for deposits are established by banking regulations and Oregon law. FDIC insurance of \$250,000 applies to the deposits in each depository. ORS 295 governs the collateralization of Oregon public funds and provides the statutory requirements for the Oregon Public Funds Collateralization Program (PFCP). Where balances continually exceed \$250,000, ORS 295 requires the depositor to verify that deposit accounts are only maintained at financial institutions on the list of qualified depositories found on the state treasurer's website.

Custodial Credit Risk for Deposits - Custodial credit risk for deposits exists when, in the event of a depository failure, the District's deposits may not be returned to it. The District does not have a deposit policy for custodial credit risk.

As of June 30, 2024, the reported amount of the District's deposits was \$509,493. The bank balance was \$557,698. Of the bank balance, the entire amount was insured by the FDIC or covered by the collateral held in a multiple financial institutions collateral pool administered by the Oregon State Treasurer. The District also held \$516 in Petty Cash.

Investments - Oregon statutes authorize the District to invest in obligations of the U.S. Treasury and U.S. agencies, banker's acceptances, repurchase agreements, commercial paper rated A-1 by Standard & Poor's Corporation or P-1 by Moody's Commercial Paper Record, and the Local Governmental Investment Pool. The District has no credit risk policy or investment policy that would further limit its investment choices.

Credit Risk - Credit risk exists when there is a possibility the issuer or other counterparty to an investment may be unable to fulfill its obligations. As of June 30, 2024, the District's had no investments.

Concentration of Credit Risk - An increased risk of loss occurs as more investments are acquired from one issuer. This results in a *concentration of credit risk*. The District places no limit on the amount that may be invested in any one issuer. The District had no investments throughout the fiscal year ending June 30, 2024.

The District entered into a full faith and credit financing agreement with Umpqua Bank on October 30, 2020, to purchase an operations facility and make improvements. The original balance of the note is \$550,000. The interest rate is fixed at 3.226%. Payments are to be made annually on December 1. Interest payments are to be made semi-annually on June 1 and December 1.

INTERFUND TRANSFERS:

No inter-fund transfers were recorded during the fiscal year ending June 30, 2024.

CONTINGENT LIABILITIES:

Amounts received or receivable from grantor agencies are subject to review and adjustment by grantor agencies, principally the State and federal governments. Any disallowed claims, including amounts already collected, may constitute a liability of the applicable funds. The amount, if any, of expenditures that may be disallowed by the grantor cannot be determined at this time although the District expects such amount, if any, to be immaterial.

The District is not currently named as a defendant in any pending or threatened litigation.

RISK:

To reduce the risk of loss from liability, fire, theft, accident, medical costs, and errors and omissions, the District maintains various commercial insurance policies.

The District came under the State Unemployment Act on July 1, 1974. The District has elected to pay State Unemployment Insurance to the State to pay for any claims paid to former employees. Any reimbursements are paid by the fund incurring the liability to the Employment Division of the State of Oregon. The estimated liability for unpaid claims is calculated as the present value of expected but unpaid claims based on historical experience and ongoing concern assessments. The District's estimated liability for unpaid unemployment claims is immaterial. Therefore, no liability amount appears on the District's statement of net position or balance sheet.

There have been no significant reductions in coverage from the prior years and settlements have not exceeded insurance coverage in the past three years.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT REQUIRED BY OREGON STATE REGULATIONS

To the Governing Body of the Umpqua Public Transportation District

We have audited the basic financial statements of the Umpqua Public Transportation District as of and for the year ended June 30, 2024, and have issued our report thereon dated December 31, 2024. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America.

Compliance

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether the Umpqua Public Transportation District's financial statements are free of material misstatement, we performed tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grants, including the provisions of Oregon Revised Statutes as specified in Oregon Administrative Rules 162-10-000 through 162-10-320 of the Minimum Standards for Audits of Oregon Municipal Corporations, noncompliance with which could have a direct and material effect on the determination of financial statements amounts. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of our audit, and accordingly, we do not express such an opinion.

We performed procedures to the extent we considered necessary to address the required comments and disclosures which included, but were not limited to the following:

- **Deposit of public funds with financial institutions (ORS Chapter 295).**
- **Indebtedness limitations, restrictions and repayment.**
- **Budgets legally required (ORS Chapter 294).**
- **Insurance and fidelity bonds in force or required by law.**
- **Programs funded from outside sources.**
- **Authorized investment of surplus funds (ORS Chapter 294).**
- **Public contracts and purchasing (ORS Chapters 279A, 279B, 279C).**

In connection with our testing, nothing came to our attention that caused us to believe the District was not in substantial compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grants, including the provisions of Oregon Revised Statutes as specified in Oregon Administrative Rules 162-10-000 through 162-10-320 of the Minimum Standards for Audits of Oregon Municipal Corporations, except as follows:

Material weaknesses exist in relation to State and federal award program compliance requirements. Program management and expenditure reporting deficiencies are described in detail in the Single Audit Schedule of 'Findings and Questioned Costs. The deficiencies described there also apply to State transportation grant programs.

OAR 162-10-0230 Internal Control

In planning and performing our audit, we considered the District's internal control over financial reporting as a basis for designing my auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing my opinion on the financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the District's internal control over financial reporting. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of the District's internal control over financial reporting.

This report is intended solely for the information and use of the Board of Directors and management of Umpqua Public Transportation District and the Oregon Secretary of State and is not intended to be and should not be used by anyone other than these parties.

Report on Internal Control over Financial Reporting

In planning and performing our audit of the financial statements, we considered Umpqua Public Transportation District’s internal control over financial reporting (internal control) as a basis for designing the audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of Umpqua Public Transportation District’s internal control. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of Umpqua Public Transportation District’s internal control.

A deficiency in internal control exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent, or detect and correct, misstatements on a timely basis. *A material weakness* is a deficiency, or combination of deficiencies, in internal control such that there is a reasonable possibility that a material misstatement of the entity’s financial statements will not be prevented, or detected and corrected, on a timely basis. *A significant deficiency* is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control that is less severe than a material weakness, yet important enough to merit attention by those charged with governance.

Our consideration of internal control was for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph and was not designed to identify all deficiencies in internal control that might be material weaknesses or significant deficiencies and therefore, material weaknesses or significant deficiencies may exist that have not been identified. We identified certain deficiencies in internal control, described in the accompanying schedule of findings and questioned costs as item 2024-001, and 2024-002 that we consider to be a material weakness.

Report on Compliance and Other Matters

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether Umpqua Public Transportation District's financial statements are free of material misstatement, we performed tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements, noncompliance with which could have a direct and material effect on the determination of financial statements. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of our audit, and accordingly, we do not express such an opinion. The results of our tests disclosed instances of noncompliance or other matters that are required to be reported under *Government Auditing Standards* and which are described in the accompanying schedule of findings and questioned costs as items 2024-002 and 2024-003.

Umpqua Public Transportation District's Response to Findings

Government Auditing Standards requires the auditor to perform limited procedures on Umpqua Public Transportation District's responses to the findings identified in our audit and described in the accompanying schedule of findings and questioned costs. Umpqua Public Transportation District's response was not subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the financial statements and, accordingly, we express no opinion on the responses.

Purpose of this Report

The purpose of this report is solely to describe the scope of our testing of internal control and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the effectiveness of the organization's internal control or on compliance. This report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* in considering the entity's internal control and compliance. Accordingly, this communication is not suitable for any other purpose.

Report on Compliance for Each Major Federal Program

Qualified Opinions

We have audited Umpqua Public Transportation District’s compliance with the types of compliance requirements described in the OMB *Circular Compliance Supplement* that could have a direct and material effect on each of Umpqua Public Transportation District’s major federal programs for the year ended June 30, 2024. Umpqua Public Transportation District’s major federal programs are identified in the summary of auditor’s results section of the accompanying schedule of findings and questioned costs.

Qualified Opinion on 20.509 Formula Grants for Rural Areas and Tribal Transit Program and 20.513 Enhanced Mobility of Seniors and Individuals with Disabilities

In our opinion, except for the noncompliance described in the Basis for Qualified Opinion section of our report paragraph, Umpqua Public Transportation District complied, in all material respects, with the types of compliance requirements referred to above that could have a direct and material effect on the Transit Services Program for the year ended June 30, 2024.

Basis for Qualified Opinions

We conducted our audit of compliance in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America; the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards* issued by the Comptroller General of the United States; and the audit requirements of Title 2 U.S. Code of Federal Regulations Part 200, Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards (Uniform Guidance). Our responsibilities under those standards and the Uniform Guidance are further described in the Auditor’s Responsibilities for the Audit of Compliance section of our report.

We are required to be independent of Umpqua Public Transportation District and to meet our other ethical responsibilities, in accordance with relevant ethical requirements relating to our audit. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our qualified opinions on compliance for each major federal program. Our audit does not provide a legal determination of Umpqua Public Transportation District’s compliance requirements referred to above.

Matters Giving Rise to Qualified Opinion on 20.509 Formula Grants for Rural Areas and Tribal Transit Program and 20.513 Enhanced Mobility of Seniors and Individuals with Disabilities

As described in the accompanying schedule of findings and questioned costs, Umpqua Public Transportation District did not comply with requirements regarding 20.509 Formula Grants for Rural Areas and Tribal Transit Program and 20.513 Enhanced Mobility of Seniors and Individuals with Disabilities as described in finding numbers 2024-003 Sources Documentation, and 2024-004 Schedule of Expenditures of Federal Awards, Strengthen Controls Over the Federal Grant Activity Schedule.

Compliance with such requirements is necessary, in our opinion, for the Umpqua Public Transportation District to comply with the requirements applicable to that program.

Responsibilities of Management for Compliance

Management is responsible for compliance with the requirements referred to above and for the design, implementation, and maintenance of effective internal control over compliance with the requirements of laws, statutes, regulations, rules, and provisions of contracts or grant agreements applicable to Umpqua Public Transportation District's federal programs.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of Compliance

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether material noncompliance with the compliance requirements referred to above occurred, whether due to fraud or error, and express an opinion on Umpqua Public Transportation District's compliance based on our audit. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not absolute assurance and therefore is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, *Government Auditing Standards*, and the Uniform Guidance will always detect material noncompliance when it exists. The risk of not detecting material noncompliance resulting from fraud is higher than for that resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control. Noncompliance with compliance requirements referred to above is considered material if there is a substantial likelihood that, individually or in the aggregate, it would influence the judgment made by a reasonable user of the report on compliance about Umpqua Public Transportation District's compliance with the requirements of each major program as a whole.

In performing an audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, *Government Auditing Standards*, and the Uniform Guidance, we

- Exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit.
- Identify and assess the risks of material noncompliance whether due to fraud or error, and design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks. Such procedures include examining, on a test basis, evidence regarding Umpqua Public Transportation District's compliance with the compliance requirements referred to above and performing such other procedures as we have considered necessary in the circumstances.
- Obtain an understanding of Umpqua Public Transportation District's internal control over compliance relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances and to test and report on internal control over compliance in accordance with Uniform Guidance, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of Umpqua Public Transportation District's internal control over compliance. Accordingly, no such opinion is expressed.

We are required to communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit and any significant deficiencies and material weaknesses in internal control over compliance that we identified during the audit.

Other Matters

Government Auditing Standards requires the auditor to perform limited procedures on Umpqua Public Transportation District's response to the noncompliance findings identified in our compliance audit described in the accompanying schedule of findings and questioned costs. Umpqua Public Transportation District's response was not subjected to the other auditing procedures applied in the audit of compliance, and accordingly, we express no opinion on the response.

Report on Internal Control over Compliance

Our consideration of internal control over compliance was for the limited purpose described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of Compliance section above and was not designed to identify all deficiencies in internal control over compliance that might be material weaknesses or significant deficiencies and therefore, material weaknesses or significant deficiencies may exist that have not been identified. However, as discussed below, we did identify certain deficiencies in internal control over compliance that we consider to be material weaknesses.

A deficiency in internal control over compliance exists when the design or operation of a control over compliance does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent, or detect and correct, noncompliance with a type of compliance requirement of a federal program on a timely basis. A *material weakness in internal control over compliance* is a deficiency, or combination of deficiencies, in internal control over compliance, such that there is a reasonable possibility that material noncompliance with a type of compliance requirement of a federal program will not be prevented, or detected and corrected, on a timely basis. We consider the deficiencies in internal control over compliance described in the accompanying schedule of findings and questioned costs as item 2024-003 and 2024-004 to be material weaknesses.

Government Auditing Standards require the auditor to perform limited procedures on Umpqua Public Transportation District's response to the internal control over compliance findings identified in our compliance audit described in the accompanying schedule of findings and questioned costs. Umpqua Public Transportation District's response was not subject to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of compliance and, accordingly, we express no opinion on the response.

The purpose of this report on internal control over compliance is solely to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over compliance and the results of that testing based on the requirements of the Uniform Guidance. Accordingly, this report is not suitable for any other purpose.

Section II—Financial Statements Findings

This part of the Schedule of Findings and Questioned Costs presents audit findings classified as material weaknesses, significant deficiencies and material noncompliance that are related to the financial statements and are required to be reported in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*.

Finding 2024-001 -Control Environment over Financial Reporting (Material Weakness)

Criteria: Effective internal control over financial reporting is entirely dependent upon leadership creating an environment for employees to gain the skills, knowledge and experience to effectively perform their assigned functions to prevent or detect material misstatements in the financial reporting of all district funds.

Condition: Management failed to provide the necessary environment for designing and implementing internal controls.

Cause: The General Manager was not well informed on relevant regulations and requirements which resulted in an environment in which weaknesses in financial reporting exist. The Board of Directors members were equally unaware of the need for internal controls.

Effect or Potential Effect: Poor internal control environment allows for poor or weak internal controls, which allows for significant risk of material financial misstatements due to errors and irregularities. Additionally, matters of unaddressed risks of noncompliance increase the risk that material misstatements in financial reporting may exist.

Questioned Cost: No

Context: Without clear understanding of the importance of adequate internal control design and implementation, financial reporting risks and compliance risks are not addressed. Those unaddressed risks ultimately can lead to significant risk that the organization will lose its State and Federal funding necessary to continue operations.

Repeat of a Prior-Year Finding: No

District's Response: The District acknowledges the weaknesses. The Board has indicated its willingness and desire actively engage in creating a quality internal control environment.

Corrective Action Plan: The District's General Manager resigned effective September 13, 2024. The Board has adopted a plan to procure qualified professional assistance to evaluate and restructure the organization and assist in daily management activities until a new General Manager can be hired and trained. The Board acknowledges the need for greater involvement in oversight.

Planned Implementation Date: September 30, 2024

Responsible Persons: District Board, Umpqua Public Transit District

Finding 2024-002 - Source Documentation, Internal Controls over Financial Reporting (Material Weakness)

Criteria: Management is responsible for establishing and maintaining effective internal control over financial reporting. Internal controls should allow management or employees in the normal course of performing their assigned functions to prevent or detect material misstatements in the financial reporting of all district funds.

Condition: During portions of the fiscal year, the District prepared reimbursement calculations relying on an internally developed spreadsheet tool, rather than using amounts solely obtained from the general ledger and supporting documentation. The reimbursement reports were prepared by management with limited review. Conflicts over review and other monitoring procedures occurred regularly and were not always resolved. Complete supporting documentation for the claimed costs were not always available. Claims and other financial reports due to ODOT were regularly submitted after the due dates.

Cause: Internal control procedures assuring timely and accurate preparation of reports and filing of the reimbursement requests were not designed or implemented adequately. Maintaining sufficient and accurate supporting documentation for each report was not possible because original data was not relied upon by management, to complete the reports and reimbursement requests.

Effect or Potential Effect: The lack of effective internal control activities over financial reporting allowed for reporting and claims errors, from simple calculation errors to requests for reimbursements of unauthorized purposes. Improper financial reporting to the ODOT occurred regularly. Lack of timely filing of reimbursement requests for amounts claimed, resulted in lost revenues and claims that may be required to be returned. These weaknesses allow for the possibility that accounts receivable balances are misstated, and amounts payable may or may not be properly reported.

Questioned Cost: No

Context: Delays in filing reimbursement claims, delays in filing financial reports to ODOT, and internal disputes regarding completion of grant reimbursement request procedures were evident. Weak or nonexistent controls over financial management resulted in lost revenues and risks of creating unnecessary liabilities in the form of refunds due to ODOT. Adjustments to correct the financial statements may ultimately be necessary to properly reflect currently unidentified payable amounts.

Condition: During portions of the fiscal year, the District prepared reimbursement calculations relying on an internally developed spreadsheet tool, rather than using amounts solely obtained from the general ledger and supporting documentation. The reimbursement reports were prepared by management with limited review. Conflicts over review and other monitoring procedures occurred, and were not always resolved. Complete supporting documentation for the claimed costs were not always available. Claims and other financial reports due to ODOT were regularly submitted after the due dates. The late and/or unsubstantiated filings have resulted in lost claims for the District, and potential refunding of reimbursements received.

Cause: Internal control procedures assuring timely and accurate preparation of reports and filing of the reimbursement requests were not designed or implemented adequately. Maintaining sufficient and accurate supporting documentation for each report was not possible because original data was not relied upon by management, to complete the reports and reimbursement requests.

Effect or Potential Effect: The lack of effective internal control activities over cash management, including financial reporting, allowed for reporting and claims errors, from simple calculation errors to requests for reimbursements of unauthorized purposes. Improper financial reporting to the ODOT occurred regularly. Lack of timely filing of reimbursement requests for amounts claimed, resulted in lost revenues and claims that may be required to be returned.

Questioned Cost: No

Context: Delays in filing reimbursement claims, delays in filing financial reports to ODOT, and internal disputes regarding completion of grant reimbursement request procedures were evident. Weak or nonexistent controls over cash management, including fiscal management, may result in lost revenues and risks of creating unnecessary liabilities in the form of refunds due to ODOT.

Condition: During portions of the fiscal year, the District prepared reimbursement calculations according to an internally developed spreadsheet tool, rather than using amounts directly obtained from the general ledger and supporting documentation. The reimbursement reports were to be reviewed by the District Manager prior to submission. Approval of the reimbursement requests and supporting reports by the District Manager were often delayed.

Repeat of a Prior-Year Finding: Yes.

Status: Improvements continued to reduce the risk that expenditures may have been utilized twice for reimbursements. Separation of expenditures by grant was accomplished by using the "Jobs" feature of QuickBooks and assigning costs to grants by adding detail to the accounting within the accounting system, rather than relying solely on separate spreadsheets. For the 2023-24 fiscal year, allocation of costs in the general ledger was complete. However, grant reimbursement request reports continued to be prepared using information not directly provided from general ledger reports.

Finding 2023-02 – Source Documentation (Significant Deficiency)

Condition: The District prepared reimbursement calculations according to an internally developed spreadsheet tool, rather than using amounts directly obtained from the general ledger and supporting documentation.

Repeat of a Prior-Year Finding: Yes.

Status: General ledger accounting is much improved. However, reimbursement and compliance reports for the major programs continued to be prepared using non-substantiated information. Non-compliant reporting continued through the end of the fiscal year ending June 30, 2024. Internal controls involving monitoring of the reports did not occur regularly.

Correction Action Plan: The district was to engage an individual or firm to review general ledger reports and reconcile those reports with grant reports before issuance.

Finding 2023-03 - Fiscal Management System (Material Weakness)

The reimbursement reports were to be reviewed by the District Manager prior to submission. Approval of the reimbursement requests and supporting reports by the District Manager were often delayed.

Repeat of a Prior-Year Finding: Yes.

Status: Internal disputes continued throughout the fiscal year between the District's Finance Director and the District Manager, who completed reimbursement and compliance reports for the major programs. The disputes did not result in compliant reporting by the end of the fiscal year ending June 30, 2024. The substantiated information was not utilized in a timely manner for grant reporting and award claims, causing the District to lose over \$200,000 in federal grant awards.

Correction Action Plan: The District's Finance Manager was to continue to make improvements in general ledger recording and reporting systems so that those reports could then be used without intermediary report methods to prepare reimbursement request forms. Review of the reimbursement requests were to take place within data reports generated directly from the general ledger. The district was to engage an individual or firm to ensure that the timing and overall processes related to grant reimbursement and reporting did not result in reporting errors or omissions.
